Guided News Search

1. Select a category.
 (Major newspapers, newsletters, or ethnic news)

2. Select a news source.
 (Major newspapers, newsletters, or ethnic news)

3. Enter your search terms.
 Select where you want the computer to search. **Headline, Lead Paragraph Terms** are a good place to start.

4. Select a date range.
 For general topics, searching all available dates will often produce too many results.

MONTREAL - The World Health Organization yesterday returned **Toronto** to the list of SARS "hot zones" after Canadian health officials confirmed another outbreak.
The move by the United Nations health body dealt yet another psychological blow to Canada, still reeling from the economic impact of its first SARS outbreak and a mad cow scare that has crippled the country's beef industry.
In **Toronto**, three more patients died of SARS, severe acute respiratory syndrome, bringing the death toll to 27 in Canada's largest city and its financial capital.
